

Dear Dr. Dieterle,

I have finished editing my Editing AI Generated Content Assignment. For this assignment, I asked ChatGPT to “write a 3,000-word essay on how to write a fiction novel for beginners”. I asked it to write a 3,000-word essay and it gave me 1,176 words. I found that asking it to write a 1,500-word essay resulted in a 600–800-word essay. I chose the topic of “fiction novel writing for beginners” because of my background of having a creative writing bachelor’s degree. This would allow me to be an SME in a way so that I could fact-check while editing.

After asking ChatGPT to write this essay I checked it for plagiarism on Plagiarism Detector’s free website: <https://plagiarismdetector.net/>, it came up with one result of plagiarism that I addressed in the essay and linked the source article in the comment. I ended up rewriting that section that was plagiarized. I then checked readability on WebFX.com these were the results:

After checking for plagiarism and readability I was able to begin editing.

Several things stood out to me that I felt needed to be addressed. There are a lot of comments and highlights in this document. I highlighted many things that I thought should be commended and praised. Many of the highlights have to do with word choice and sentence structure. Four major things stood out to me, two have to do with formatting, one with plagiarism, and the other with rewriting.

1. Headers. The first thing I noticed was the number of headers in this essay. A header was placed before the beginning of each new topic that was about to be introduced. The headers would not have been a big deal if this was an article or a blog post. But to comply with MLA essay formatting I would suggest removing the headers, but not completely removing the content of them. Instead of completely deleting them, I would suggest trying to work them into the paragraph topic sentences.
2. Paragraphs. The second thing I noticed was the number of short paragraphs in the document. Many of the paragraphs did not introduce a new topic, instead, they continued to expound on the previous topic. This caused the essay to feel a little choppy to me, it did not flow as well. To combat this I would suggest combining the paragraphs below each header before deleting them, to make one large paragraph about the same topic. This should allow for more fluidity and clarity within the essay.

3. Plagiarism. The third thing I noticed was the plagiarism within the essay. I did comment and highlight it so that it would be easy to find. I would suggest deleting the plagiarized content. I wrote something similar enough to the content that it would fit the essay, to give you an idea of something to write in its place. If you would like to keep what I wrote feel free to. If you would like to credit the source instead, that is completely your call.

4. Rewriting. The last thing I noticed was the number of lengthy sentences in the essay. Many of the paragraphs seemed to be composed of three or four larger sentences. Many of the sentences I separated into new sentences and added a few words. There were also some areas that I felt needed some connecting sentences to better explain the concept or connect it to the next paragraph. I tried to keep the original voice of the text while making it more formal. I deleted a few “you”, “your”, and “we”s to make it more formal rather than informal.

These were the four major things that I noticed while reading this essay. All of the suggestions and changes I have made or would suggest making I have implemented in an example on pages 11-15. Each of the changes addresses the four major things that I noticed. Again these are suggestions, if you would like to implement them you can. If not, that is completely your decision.

Overall, I had a great time editing this piece. I tried to exercise my authority more as an editor as you suggested in my last assignment. I did run the document through readability afterward and these were the results. I am pretty disappointed by them, but I am not sure what else to do to fix it without rewriting the essay which would lead to the loss of the voice.
